Title of Report: Our Journey Forward

Preamble

St. Mary's Catholic Elementary School and Fort Vermilion Public are located in Fort Vermilion.

Following the flood, the schools were combined and will soon be housed in a new building that is set to be completed in 2024. Our teachers provide students from kindergarten to graduation with a high-quality education and the skills required to pursue goals beyond high school.

Overall, our results demonstrate deficits in literacy and numeracy. Our students show statistically significant growth in elementary, however, most struggling learners make little growth in junior and senior high. Our results also demonstrate the wide range of levels within our classes which highlight the need for small group instruction and evidence-based interventions.

Our connectivity results show that our students have positive connections with staff and peers and feel safe, valued, and cared about in our building. We continue to focus on celebrating local culture and history with the goal of weaving cultural knowledge into daily classroom instruction. Working with and learn from our Success coaches, elders and community members is imperative to this work.


Fort Vermilion School Division Attendance Boundary Review


Annually the Fort Vermilion School Division completes a review of the attendance boundaries for our schools. These boundaries determine where our Transportation Department will go to deliver students to their designated school. Anything outside of these boundaries requires a Cross Boundary request to the Director of Essential Services.


Cross boundary transportation will not be provided for students attending schools out of their attendance area. However, subject to space availability on the bus, students may ride to a school out of their area from a location on an existing bus route. Existing bus routes will not be modified to provide transportation services to students outside their attendance area.


The last boundary changes that were made was in 2018 between the Blue Hills Community School and Buffalo Head School boundaries. With the Blue Hills Community School project nearing completion we may need to revisit these boundaries again. We recommend currently that the boundaries remain the same until such time parents request their children attend high school in Blue Hills. Once we have a critical mass, we would entertain a route to be created to serve these families.

The attendance areas for student transportation are attached for review.












Hill Crest Community School Attendance Boundary
