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Timeline:

- Collaborative Response Meetings for co-planning literacy focus activities
 - September- In the first weeks of the school year, teachers will use the TTT to place students in targeted groups based on their specific needs. This process of diagnosing students and grouping <u>based on data will be a regular</u> <u>practice throughout the entire school year</u>. The grouping of students is made possible by scheduled intervention blocks.
 - September All teachers will be encouraged to work collaboratively with the Literacy Coach to improve student reading and writing skills.
 - September ESL programming will be in place to accommodate the influx of non-english students
 - November Checking the progress of the Literacy Coaching in each class/grade level
 - December Review the improvement and progress of common vocabulary
 - January end of semester TTT testing to monitor and adjust interventions
 - March/April Vocabulary review/debrief & Llteracy coach check in
 - · April Check in with interventions and adjust accordingly
 - May TTT Form C testing

Comments:

Through dedicated interventions like Companion Reading and Empower, our efforts have yielded remarkable progress in enhancing children's reading fluency and comprehension. These targeted programs have played a pivotal role in bridging the gaps that hindered students from reading at grade level. Companion Reading has provided students with a supportive environment where they can build upon their existing knowledge while engaging in meaningful conversations about the text.

Additionally, the implementation of the Empower program has empowered students to scaffold their prior knowledge of phonics to improve their decoding skills. The structured approach of these interventions has instilled the skills necessary for proficient comprehension.

As a result of these interventions, we have witnessed a significant shift in the reading abilities of our students. Reading fluency has improved, and comprehension skills have become more sophisticated. The tailored support provided by these programs has not only addressed individual learning needs but has also contributed to a collective advancement, narrowing the gaps that once hindered our students' ability to read at their respective grade levels. Our commitment to these initiatives reflects our dedication to ensuring that every child has the opportunity to thrive academically and develop a lifelong love for reading.
