School Goal 1: 95% of students will feel both safe and accepted at school with/by both staff and their peers.

Strategies:	
	ous language and culture are present everyday-
0	A Dene Culture Plan will be developed using a framework based on work done in the Tsuut'ina Nation This plan breaks down cultural learning into 4 seasons. Within each season there will be important words, classroom cultural activities and on the land activities. Examples include fire making, fishing, tipi making and hunting.
0	Each class will receive language and culture instruction weekly. This will follow the framework mentioner above.
0	Continue to work with Grzegorz Kwiecien on the local archeology project (Taiga Heritage Consulting Company).
0	Development of an early learner Dene Immersion program.
0	Continue the partnership with Kathleen Yatsille (Right to Play) and knowledge keepers in the community to provide cultural opportunities (beading, ribbon shirts/skirts, drumming)
0	Provide new staff with an educational partner from the community to teach them about Meander River and the Dene Tha Nation.
0	Set targets for Foundational Knowledge (TQS) requirements within unit and year plans.
Commu	inity Relationships:
0	Build community relationships by partnering with the health center/band office for Indigenous People's Day, Orange Shirt Day, Community Health Fair etc.
0	Home visits - Principal will visit families to build relationships and determine how to better support families.
0	Once it is safe to do so, begin inviting parents into the school for assemblies, celebrations, and events.
0	Continue to use Facebook to showcase student learning as well as communicate.
● Well-Be	
0	Access the FVSD Wellness Team and Success coaches to provide both universal and targeted programming. Programming with an Indigenous focus will be prioritized.
0	Weekly access to a Mental Health Therapist (Kansas Connellan) for students and families.
0	Continue with the cohort model , with some flexibility.
0	Teachers K-9 will continue/implement 2 nd Step Programming.
0	Continue with Gender Diversity training for staff and students.
0	Staff will complete Vicarious Trauma Training 21/22.
0	Continue to take part in Indigenous Youth Conferences.
0	Continue to recognize students through the Seven Sacred Teachings. Build on these teachings and how they can be further incorporated into school culture.
0	Bring back a school mascot/team name. Develop colours and purchase jerseys for students. Attend divisional events. (Meander River Moose)
0	Implement a skill-based PE program for grades 4-6.

School Goal 2: 90% of K-9 students working below grade level in literacy, will increase their September standard score (TOWRE, TOSREC) in reading comprehension and decoding by 5 points, by June 2022.

Strategies:

Instruction:

- Teachers K-9 will use the Lucy Calkins Reading and Writing program daily. *Up the Ladder* will be purchased to support middle school classrooms. K-3 will use the LC Phonics program.
- K-6 ELA Instruction will be 120 minutes per day
- A literacy coach will be identified to support planning and implementation. (Candice Scott (JR/SR), Erikalynne Symes (Elementary))
- Continued professional development.
- Partnering with other schools to provide grade level planning time.
- All grade 8 and 9 students will receive the Middle School EMPOWER.
- The Learning without Tears program will be used for our K4 and ECS students.
- Utilize a wide range of literature in the classroom that include non-European characters.
- Build a bank of assessment exemplars for writing.
- Include Indigenous perspectives and ways of knowing.
- Host literacy celebrations at the school.

School Goal 3: Students will improve their numeracy skills one grade level in NUMBER, based on the Alberta Program of Studies and the WRAT-5.

Strategies:

Instruction:

- CRM topics will include number sense, practical math application, mental math strategies.
- Guided Math framework K-7 (Students are receiving targeted instruction at their level).
- Math year plans will be spiral in nature so that strands are revisited a minimum of twice per year.
- K-3 will have a strong focus on numbers to 5 and numbers 10 before moving on to larger numbers.
- Number Talks will be part of regular instruction K- 9.
- (Div 1 & Div 2) Team planning numeracy blocks.
- Classroom instruction focused on a skill progression not simply grade level curriculum.
- Small group and individual instruction are provided to each student.
- Math games will be used to solidify math knowledge and skill.
- Coding is further introduced into all classrooms.

- Students will use mathematical skills while engaging in cultural activities when appropriate.
